## INTRODUCTION

Data on livebirths, deaths and fetal deaths (stillbirths) are presented in this report for the calendar year 1952. In addition, 1952 estimated population figures are included. Data are reported for the state as a whole, each county and each city of 10,000 or more population.

Certain additional data, including data for cities of 2500 to 10,000 population are available in unpublished form in the files of the Public Health Statistics Section.


Vital statistics data included in this report are identified either as residence or occurrence data. Residence data refer to vital events involving residents of the area regardless of where the vital events actually occurred. Occurrence data refer to vital events actually occurring in the area regardless of the place of residence of the persons involved. In general, data on a residence basis are the most useful.

Data for 1952 on non-resident vital events are as follows:

It can be observed that 1952 vital events occurring in this state to out of state residents were higher than vital events occurring among Washington residents outside the state.

Appendix tables contain selected morbidity data for the calendar years 1950 through 1952, and 1952 data concerning general hospital and nursing home facilities.

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





The above estimates of population for the major cities of Washington are based on the State Census Board release of population figures as of April 1, 1952 projected to July 1, 1952. The population estimates for the counties are based on the State Census Board release for the incorporated areas, the estimate, by the Office of Population Research of the University of Washington, of the total state population as of April 1, 1952 (the medium, unadjusted figure), and April 1, 1950 federal census figures.

## NATALITY


### Livebirths

Washington livebirths in 1952 were numerically the largest this state has ever known, with 62,917 births occurring in the state and 61,436 births to Washington residents. The resident birth rate of 24.6 per 1,000 population shows an increase over 1950 and 1951, but is less than the rate in the 1946 - 1949 period. Table 1 gives births from 1910 through 1952, with rates per 1,000 population. These data are presented graphically on pages 3 and 4. It can be observed that in general the trend has been upward, although a downward trend prevailed in the 1920's and early 1930's, culminating in the low rate of 13.0 in 1933.

Counties showing the highest resident birth rates for 1952 (all those over 34.0) were Jefferson, 34.8; Benton, 34.6; and Franklin, 34.2. Counties showing the lowest rates (all those under 20.0) were Island, 16.2; Skamania, 17.0; and San Juan, 18.5. Resident and occurrence births for 1952, with rates per 1,000 population are given in Table 4, page 11.

Of the total resident births, 96.2% were classified as white; 1.6% as Negro; 1.3% as Indian; and the balance Oriental or other and not stated. County data by race are given in Table 5, page 13.

Of the births by residence or by occurrence, 99.2% were born in hospitals, maternity homes or other institutions, a gain in institutional births of 0.3% over 1950. In 1951 this percentage was 99.1%. Resident data by place of birth are given in Table 7, page 17.




The sex ratio in residence livebirths was 105.7 males for every 100 females. More births were the second child of the family than the first, 29.4% of the total resident livebirths being the second child, while 28.4% were the first child, and 21.4% the third child. The order of child in the family is illustrated in the chart at left, and is presented in tabulated form in the Birth Summary Table, Page 9.

A total of 647 sets of twins were born in 1952, 625 full sets and 22 sets with 1 child a fetal death. In addition, 5 sets of triplets were born, 1 set of which had one fetal death. The county and city breakdown on multiple births is given in Table 9, page 21.

The median age of mothers in 1952 was 26 years, although the greatest percentage of births occurred in the 20 - 24 age group.

Resident illegitimate livebirths were 18.4 per 1,000 resident livebirths, occurrence illegitimate livebirths were 19.4 per 1,000 occurrence livebirths. This represents a decline from 1950 and 1951, when the resident rates were 19.9 and 18.8 respectively. The occurrence rate in 1950 was 21.3, while in 1951 it was 19.7. Table 9, page 21, contains data on illegitimate livebirths by county and city of residence and of occurrence.



Male infants weighed more at birth than female infants; the average weight for males being 7.4 pounds compared to 7.1 pounds for the female births. The above graph shows weight distribution by sex. Defining immaturity as infants weighing  $5\frac{1}{2}$  pounds or less at birth, there were 4,509 immature livebirths, or 7.3% of the total resident livebirths. Tables 9, 10 and 11, pages 21 through 26, give data by county and city on immaturity.

Pages 11 through 28 contain data on livebirths for Washington for 1952.

#### Fetal Deaths (Stillbirths)

For each 1,000 resident livebirths in 1952 there were an additional 13.9 fetal deaths, a total of 857 resident fetal deaths. In addition to the 62,917 livebirths occurring in Washington, 882 fetal deaths were also recorded, a ratio of 14.0 fetal deaths per 1,000 livebirths. For purposes of Washington vital statistics

registration, a fetal death is defined as a delivery, after at least twenty weeks gestation, in which the fetus shows no evidence of life.

Among the causes of fetal deaths, placental and cord conditions accounted for 41.1% of all resident fetal deaths. Table 15, page 31, gives further data on resident fetal deaths by causes. There were 123.8 male fetal deaths for each 100 female fetal deaths. Fetal deaths by county and city of residence and of occurrence, with ratio per 1,000 livebirths, are given in Table 13, page 29.

## MORTALITY

### General


There were 22,874 deaths of residents of Washington in 1952, a rate of 9.2 per 1,000 population. Deaths occurred in Washington at a rate of 9.3 per 1,000 population, for a total of 23,261. Pacific County had the highest resident death rate with 12.1 per 1,000 population. The lowest death rate was shown by Grant County with a rate of 4.5 per 1,000.

The sex ratio for resident deaths in 1952 was 154 male deaths for every 100 female deaths. In 1950 this ratio was 159 males for every 100 females. Of the male deaths 52% were married at the time of death, and 17% were widowers. Female deaths included 38% married and 44% widowed. The median age of males dying was 67.6; median age at death for females was 69.8. The white race accounted for 97.2% of the total deaths.

General mortality data are given in the death summary Table 16, page 35, and in Tables 17 through 33 which contain county and city data.

### Selected Causes

Table 17, page 37, gives selected causes of death for all ages, arranged according to the causes of death codes as determined by the International Statistical Classification of Causes of Death. The death summary Table also lists the twelve leading causes of death according to rank. Tables 24, 25 and 26, pages 51 through 56, give residence deaths from these twelve causes by county and city, with rates per 100,000 population.




"Diseases of the Heart" accounted for 36.6% of the total deaths in 1952, with a rate of 335.2 deaths per 100,000 population. "Diseases of the Heart" has been the leading cause of death in Washington since 1913 with the exception of pneumonia in 1918. Tuberculosis was the leading cause of death before that time but in 1952 no longer ranked as one of the ten leading causes. "Malignant Neoplasms" and "Vascular lesions affecting the central nervous system" have been second and third leading causes since the early 1920's.

The fourth leading cause "All Accidents" was the leading cause of death in the age groups from 1-4 through age group 25-34. "Malignant neoplasms" were the second leading cause in all age groups from over 1 up to 75 and over, where it was superceded by "Vascular lesions affecting the central nervous system." Suicide was the third leading cause of death in the 15-24 and the 25-34 age groups. Table 18, page 39, lists the leading causes of death in each age group for each sex, with the percentage each comprises of the total deaths in each age group.

Other causes of death, of interest though not leading causes, are given in Tables 27 and 28, pages 57 through 60. Deaths from motor vehicle accidents are included in the category "All Accidents", but are given by county and city of residence and by county and city of occurrence of deaths in Table 27, page 57. Homicides by county and city of residence and occurrence are given in Table 27, page 57. Deaths from infective and parasitic diseases, except tuberculosis, are given in Table 28, page 59.

There were 15 maternal deaths in 1952. Data on maternal deaths are given in Table 29, page 61.

### Infant



Infants accounted for 6.7% of the total deaths in 1952. The infant death rate was 24.8 per 1,000 livebirths by residence; a rise from the low of 24.3 in 1951, but still considerably below other years. As can be seen in the graph, page 4, infant mortality has experienced a steady decline since 1910.

Indians again showed the highest infant death rate, 65.6 per 1,000 Indian livebirths. This rate is much lower than the corresponding rate in 1950 of 100.7 and 117.4 in 1951. The graph at left shows infant death rates by race for 1952 resident infant deaths. Table 30, page 62, gives infant deaths by race and by county and city of residence and of occurrence, with rates per 1,000 livebirths.

Of resident infant deaths in 1952, 150.6 males died for every 100 females. In 1950 this ratio was 140.7 males to every 100 females and in 1951 it was 134.6 males to 100 females. This represents a male infant death rate for 1952 of 29.0 and a female infant death rate of 20.3.

The greatest number of infant deaths occurred under the International List category 760-776, "Certain diseases of early infancy", with 64.7% of the 1952 resident infant deaths in that category. Of this group immaturity mentioned with some other condition, and immaturity unqualified accounted for the greatest number of deaths, 45.5% of the total infant deaths. Congenital malformations accounted for 16.0% of the remaining infant deaths, followed by 5.6% dying from influenza and pneumonia (not including pneumonia of the newborn, which are included in the category "Certain diseases of early infancy") and 5.0% dying from accidents.

Table 31, page 64, gives a detailed breakdown of infant deaths by cause, sex, and age of infant. Table 32, page 66, lists leading causes for the counties and major cities. Resident neonatal deaths, those under 28 days, accounted for 75.7% of the total resident infant deaths in 1952. Neonatal deaths by county and city of residence are given in Table 33, page 68.
