



# Implementation of RCW 43.70.825: Expanding School-Based Health Centers





### Awards

The Department of Health made 17 grant awards in Washington State.

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# Funding

Over \$2 million was awarded to support to school-based health centers across the state.



# Support

Awards will support new and existing SBHCs and include technical assistance, support, and resources for SBHCs. <u>RCW 43.70.825</u> directs the Department of Health to establish a school-based health center program to:

- Expand and sustain the availability of SBHCs for K-12 students in public schools throughout the state.
- Prioritize funding for and activities in communities that are historically underserved.

#### A school-based health center (SBHC) is:

- A student-focused health center located in or adjacent to a school.
- Provides integrated medical, behavioral health, and other health care services like dental care.
- A collaboration between the community, the school, and a sponsoring healthcare agency that operates the SBHC.

## How were awards decided?

Grant awards were made based on:

- Overall application scores determined by an application review committee who understands the healthcare needs of young people
- Location of proposed project in Washington
- Applicants' commitment to serving students from communities and groups that are historically underserved and who are furthest from educational justice
