

This is a special time in your life and the Washington State Department of Health wants to make sure you and your baby have the best start possible.

As a Washington State resident, you get these great, free resources from us:

- Mailed reminders about which vaccines your child may need and how to get ready for well-child visits. These reminders are known as the Watch Me Grow Washington mailings. They also include up-to-date health, safety, development, and other care giving information.
- Access to your family's vaccine records online.

What is Watch Me Grow Washington?


Watch Me Grow Washington is our state's vaccine and well-child visit reminder system. The Washington State Department of Health (DOH) uses the Watch Me Grow program to remind you of upcoming well-child visits and send health and safety information to you and all families in the state with children newborn to 6 years old.

How does it work?

The DOH uses the address information from the Washington State Immunization Information System (WAIIS) to coordinate the mailings. We receive this information in the following ways:

- When your baby is born in Washington State, your child's birth certificate is filed with the DOH. Public Information, like your name and child's date of birth, goes to the WAIIS, creating a record.
- If your baby gets the hepatitis B (HepB) birth dose vaccine before leaving the hospital, that information also goes to the WAIIS, creating a record.
- If your child was born in a another state and you move to Washington or if you adopt a child, once your child gets a vaccine from their doctor or nurse, that information goes to the WAIIS and it creates a record.

These records tells us to start sending you the Watch Me Grow Washington mailings.

Watch Me Grow Washington

What are the mailings?

The Watch Me Grow Washington health promotion mailings are to help you get ready for your child's next wellchild visit. You will get a mailing a few weeks before your child's next visit until your child turns 6 years old.

The mailings are free. The materials in the mailings are updated every year by health and safety experts with input from parents and caregivers.

You automatically get the information by regular mail. If you want to get Watch Me Grow by email, go to



Washington State Immunization Information System (WAIIS)





Ask the doctor if I am up to date on my vaccines.

What is it?

The Washington State Immunization Information System, also known as WAIIS, is our state's lifetime immunization registry. It helps health care providers keep track of vaccine records (also called immunization records) for babies, children, teens, and adults.

Doctors, clinics, pharmacies, and health plans enter the vaccines their patients get into the system. Most health care providers in Washington State participate in the system. They can use

- Keep vaccine records up to date. This information may be needed for school, child care, camp, college, the military, and long-term care facilities. Some employers also need a copy of vaccine records.
- See which vaccines patients need at each visit. This helps make sure they are up to date and will not get doses of vaccine they don't need.

- Keep all vaccine records in one place. This is helpful if you or your child change clinics or doctors.
- Print a current vaccine record or official certificate for preschool, child care, or school.

Watch Me Grow Washington is part of the WAIIS and they share a database. This database gathers information from health care providers, health plans, and the public part of your child's birth certificate. This information usually includes:

- Child's name and mother's name.
- Birthdate and sex at birth.
- · Mailing address.
- · Vaccine history.

If you need help or have questions, talk with your child's doctor or clinic. If you do not want your or your child's information in the WAIIS, call Office of Immunizations at 1-866-397-0337 or visit bit.ly/doh-WAIISinfo.

Vaccine Records

How to access:

There are a few ways to get copies of your family's vaccine records:

- Contact your family's doctor, pharmacy, clinic, or your child's school.
- Go to myirmobile.com to see and download your family's vaccine records online. You can also print the official certificate needed for child care, preschool, and school.

All records are protected from anyone who shouldn't see them. Only those who are authorized under state law and have a signed agreement with the DOH can view and use vaccine records in the system.

You have the right to review your and your child's records, ask questions, and make corrections. If you have any questions, talk with your doctor or clinic. The following people can view and use records:

- Doctors, nurses, clinics, or pharmacies providing care to you or your child.
- School staff helping toget vaccine records needed to go to school.
- Health officials or approved researchers working to improve the health of Washington residents.
