## DOH Latino, Latina, and Latinx Community Partner Space Minutes

August 18th, 2022

#### I. Welcome & Introductions – Bella Mendez

### II. Updates and questions from partners

- How is DOH planning on doing back-to-school messaging for COVID-19 and monkeypox, including at detention facilities?
  - Updated COVID-19 guidance for schools: <u>https://doh.wa.gov/sites/default/files/2022-08/825058-</u> <u>COVID19SchoolGuidanceBrief.pdf</u>
  - There has been a member of the Community Relations and Equity team activated to respond to all monkeypox requests, including community partner feedback and concerns.
    - Bella can invite Rael to the next meeting for a more formal discussion.
  - DOH is working with Desautel Hege (a contractor that has been overseeing emergency outreach services for COVID-19 work) to conduct community outreach around monkeypox.
- Cyndi: 1000 people came to the Benton-Franklin Health District (BFHD) back-to-school event on the 13<sup>th</sup>
  - 58 COVID-19 vaccines were provided by the Care-A-Van.
  - BFHD ran out of all the supplies they had to provide, distributing 185 backpacks just in the first hour of the event.
  - 20 community partners sponsored this event.
  - Utilizing DOH distribution lists and portals to share events widely helped to promote the event.

#### III. Infographic review

- Infographic 1 (slide 14): Vaccination series completion rate in the Latinx community
  - Updated wording to be more "plain talk"
  - Figures shown in previous infographics were not accurate, so the figures were updated to what is shown in this version.
  - Changed wording from "general population" to "statewide"
  - Should we include a call-to-action message here?
    - "Does a friend or family member need help getting vaccinated?"
- Infographic 2 (slide 15): Vaccination by age group and ethnicity
  - Added the data source and tried to highlight the age groups that are the farthest behind the statewide average by putting yellow boxes around them.
  - Call to action: Early in the pandemic, a lot of messaging focused on protecting the elderly. We can shift that messaging to protecting everyone. COVID-19 is devastating for all ages, not just the elderly.
- Infographic 3 (slide 16): Vaccination for Latinos ages 5-11
  - Changed wording from "general population" to "statewide"
  - Darkened percentage markers on the bar chart
  - Switched girl's dress color to match the Latino bar in the chart
  - Added exact percentages to the bars in the chart
  - Edited wording to be clearer
  - Call to action:
    - While the overall vaccination rate for this age group is not high, Latinx folks are still lagging behind the statewide rates.
    - Messaging should also take into consideration that Latinx groups are very protective of their children
    - Kids are going back to school and will be around other kids who will attend different events outside of school. We want to keep COVID-19 restrictions (for example, not having to isolate, etc) lax, so getting our kids vaccinated will help accomplish this.
    - Emphasize that vaccines are safe.
- Infographic 4 (slide 17): Vaccination for Latinos ages 25-34
  - Added exact percentages to the bars in the chart
  - Changed wording from "general population" to "statewide"
  - Does the wording "vaccination series" resonate with the Latinx community?

- It's okay, but it should define what "series" means.
- Consider adding an asterisk and defining it at the bottom of the infographic.
- Consider showing a vaccination card instead of a needle.
- Infographic 5 (slide 18): Deaths by vaccination status
  - Removed deaths of people who have been vaccinated
    - There was too much information on one infographic to properly communicate everything.
  - Clarified that the figures presented are for the entire country
    - "Jurisdictions" might be too complicated of a word. Either change it to a simpler unit like "states" or remove it.
- Infographic 6 (slide 19): Vaccination status and likelihood of getting COVID-19
  - Changed wording to be clear that the call to action was vaccination, not testing.
- Infographic 7 (slide 20): Case rate by ethnicity
  - Added units (per 100,000 for the week of June 25<sup>th</sup>) and data source.
  - This infographic is still missing data for the Asian community. Bella is working to get that information added.
- Infographic 8 (slide 21): Rates of death by vaccination status between January and May of 2022
  - Even though it does show that deaths have overall declined since the beginning of the year, the difference in deaths between vaccination status is still quite large.
  - Change "more at risk" to "more likely to"
  - The B in "by" is bolded, but the Y is not
  - Remove the word "jurisdiction"
- Bella will take this feedback and finalize the infographics. They will then be sent off for translation.

## IV. Objective #2: Create messaging for late summer/early fall in Spanish and Indigenous languages that can easily be shared in audio form

  - Currently, there is not a lot of social media messaging from DOH in Spanish targeted to parents of children. That could be something this group focuses on creating in the upcoming weeks.

- Partner idea: Providing Spanish COVID-19 self-testing instructions because many kits do not include Spanish instructions.
  - With the decrease in in-person testing locations, we need to develop instructions for what to do if you need to test but don't have an at-home test.
    - Some options: Instructions for how to use an at-home test, referral to their primary care provider, or instructions on how to find at-home tests for free.
  - This can also include guidance for other situations, such as what to do before you go to a large gathering or how to report a positive test when you test at home.
  - Instructions for self-testing can be paired with infographics about testing/getting COVID-19.
