Refine the process for zone selection including the use of data

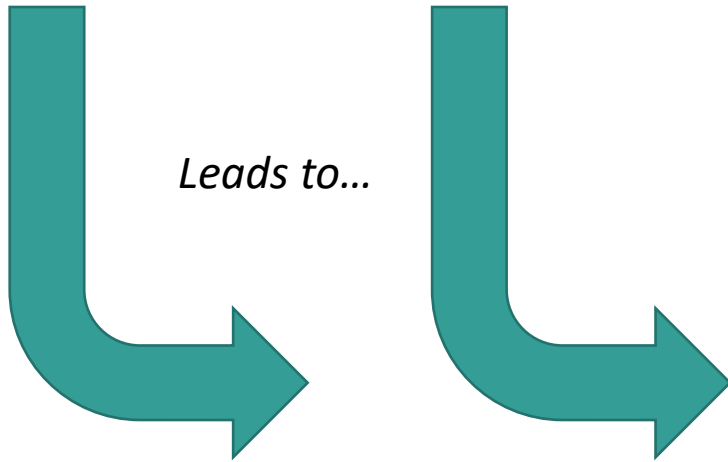
# Community Agreements

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- Assume positive intent.
- Acknowledge and accept impact.
- Be aware of the space you take up.
- Engage in dialogue – not debate.
- Hold yourself and others accountable for demonstrating cultural humility.
- Be open, transparent, and willing to make mistakes.
- Embrace the power of humble listening.
- Create trusting and brave spaces – where a little bit of discomfort is okay.
- Commit to having conversations that matter by speaking up to bridge divides.
- Define terms – don't assume that everyone knows specialty acronyms or terms.

# Proposed Zone Selection Process

## Step 1

Individuals that live and/or work in communities that meet the eligibility criteria can submit a nomination form.

### *Eligibility criteria:*

- Community must be geographically-defined; this can include cities, zip codes, neighborhoods, or census-tracts.
- Population in geographically-defined community is not to exceed 8,000 people.
- Proposed community is ranked 10<sup>th</sup> for health disparities on the Washington Tracking Network map.

## Step 2

**CAC scores nomination forms using rubric and guiding principles assessment tool.**

## Step 3

**CAC convenes to review highest scored nominees and compare against priority communities. CAC votes in meeting to select zones.**

*Representation from priority communities:*

- *Communities facing intersectional social determinants*
- *Native communities*
- *Black and brown communities / communities impacted by racism or a lack of culturally and linguistically appropriate services*
- *Communities without access to behavioral health and oral health services*
- *Under-resourced/ low-income communities*
- *Rural communities*
- *Migrant communities / undocumented communities, refugees and asylum seekers*
- *Communities experiencing long-term illness and disability*
- *LGBTQ+ communities*

## Step 4

**CAC and DOH hold meet and greet with top nominees to congratulate and share about next steps for those interested in moving forward.**



## Step 5

# Backbone organizations are selected by HEZ Community Collaboratives.

*Requirements for backbone organizations:*

- *led by and serves people most impacted by health inequities and/or social determinants of health.*
- *demonstrates capacity and infrastructure to organize Community Collaborative efforts and/or identifies support needed to succeed.*
- *demonstrates commitment and community-buy in to close equity gaps using letters of support and/or community references.*
- *Eligible entities include community-based organizations, coalitions, networks, collaboratives, non-profit organizations, tribal organizations, and local government. For-profit organizations are not eligible.*

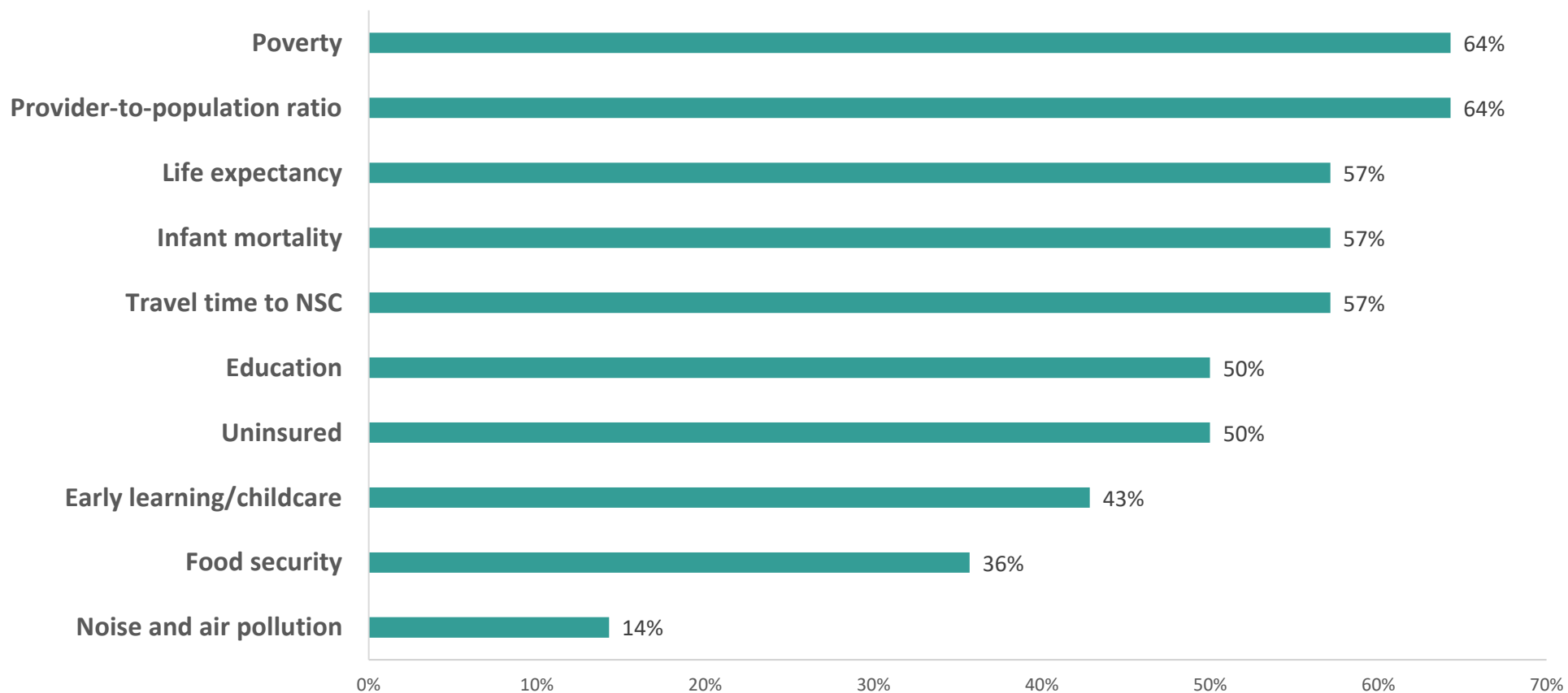

# Map Considerations

## **Using pre-set topic groupings** *(for example, health disparities topic)*

- Pro: it will be easier for the applicant to determine whether they meet the criteria
- Con: it will not allow us to customize metrics based on those of greater importance

## **Selecting a ranking score threshold** *(for example, only communities ranked 10<sup>th</sup> are eligible to apply)*

- Pro: it will narrow applicant pool based on those with greatest disparities
- Con: it will exclude some communities with significant disparities
