Avoid Mosquito Bites

How to choose and use insect repellent



Why should I use insect repellent?

Mosquitoes in Washington can carry viruses, like West Nile virus. Most people infected with West Nile virus will have no or mild symptoms, but a small number of people may have serious, or even fatal, illness. Prevent West Nile virus by avoiding mosquito bites.

What is insect repellent?

Insect repellents help protect against mosquito bites. Apply repellent when you are spending time in areas with mosquitoes.

Which repellent should I choose?

EPA-registered insect repellents are tested and approved for safety and are effective when used according to the directions on the label. Active ingredients in EPA-registered insect repellents include DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or 2-undecanone. Look for a repellent that is labeled as EPA-registered.



How can I use repellent safely?

Follow all label directions. Only use repellent on exposed skin. Avoid getting repellent in your eyes or mouth, and assist children when applying repellent.
