P 002	Schools shall conduct no less than one safety-related drill each month-emergency evacuation (fire) drills at least monthly during the school year. Schools shall complete no less than one drill using the school mapping information system, and drill or lockdowns, one drill for shelter-in-place and six drills for tire evacuation in accordance with the state fire code. School administrators should consult with their local five department and county emergency services coordinator for local requirements. P 003	Alarms for all emergency exit drills shall be by the appropriate school building administrator or his designee without advance announcement to building occupants.
