Fentanyl

Fentanyl is a powerful synthetic opioid that temporarily reduces pain by suppressing nervous system activity. Its family of drugs accounted for 68% of drug overdoses in WA¹.

Illicitly Manufactured Fentanyl (IMF)

- Distributed through illegal drug markets
- Commonly mixed with other drugs
- Statewide IMF
 overdose deaths have
 doubled each year
 from 2019 to 2021




Overdose Data in WA

- 649 fentanyl overdose deaths in WA in 2022
- People ages 25-44 made up over 50% of IMF deaths in 2022


Percentage of IMF Overdose Deaths in 2022 by Age Group



Facts and Stats







This is a 32% disproportionality

- 10% of IMF overdose deaths affected Black people in 2022
 - 4.5% of WA's population is Black
 - This is a 122% disproportionality
- Males made up 79% of IMF deaths
- Workers in the construction industry accounted for 21% of fentanyl overdoses in 2022 – the most of all industries

What Do You Do?

- Someone overdosing?
 - Call 911
 - Administer naloxone
 - Keep the person awake and breathing
 - Lay the person on their side
 - Stay with them until emergency workers arrive³
- Need help with drug addiction?
 - Call 800-662-4357*
- Be cautious: you can't always see it, smell it, or taste it

Signs of overdose³:

- "pinpoint" pupils
- loss of consciousness
- weak/no breathing
- choking or gurgling sounds
- cold/clammy skin
- skin discoloration in lips and nails
