
# **BATS & THE ENVIRONMENT**




Bats eat bugs and pollinate flowers. Enjoy bats from far away so they can work!

#### WHAT IS RABIES?

Rabies is a virus that can cause death.



Bats can carry rabies, and they can spread rabies to other animals, including your pets.



You could get rabies from a bat scratch or bite.



## IF YOU SEE A BAT:

Bats are cool animals. But if you see a bat, stay away from it!



If you see or touch a bat, or a bat bites or scratches, or touches you, tell an adult right away. You won't be in trouble!




# IF YOU SEE A BAT:



If you see a bat on the ground, tell an adult right away and don't touch it. The bat may be sick.

## **KEEP YOUR PETS SAFE:**




Ask your family if your pets have gotten the rabies shot.


#### DO YOU KNOW WHAT TO DO?

You're playing with your friends at recess.




You go to the playground and notice a bat underneath the slide.






# WHAT TO DO:

Don't touch the bat and tell an adult right away.



An adult will make a call to public health for next steps.



#### **REMEMBER:**

Bats are important to our ecosystems, but they can germs that can make us sick.



Respect bats by observing them from far away. If you find a bat, tell an adult right away!
