## Intravenous Therapy Services

Determine if your provider credentials allow you to order medications under your license. <sup>1</sup>		
Determine if you plan to order patient-specific medications, bulk drug products for office stock, or both.		
Order patient-specific medications from a facility licensed by PQAC & authorized to compound medications, or your scope of practice allows for office-based dispensing of compounded products <sup>2</sup>		
Order bulk drug products for office stock from a wholesaler licensed by PQAC & authorized to sell medications in WA. <sup>2</sup>		As defined in the Pharmacy Practice Act, "Wholesaler" means a corporation, individual, or other entity which buys drugs or devices for resale and distribution to corporations, individuals, or entities other than consumers. Ensure the medications are appropriately labeled. <sup>3</sup>		
Handle and store compounded patient-specific medications appropriately. <sup>5,7</sup>		
Contact the compounder(s) with any questions about the supplied patient-specific medications.		
Contact the wholesaler with any questions about the supplied bulk drug products for office stock.		
Ensure the medications are stored in safe and sanitary location(s). <sup>5</sup>		USP = the United States Pharmacopeia.
