





# Drinking Water Survey Results

- 54 People Surveyed
- 93% of respondents either live, work, or recreate in the Leavenworth area.
- 19% correctly answered that both the Icicle River and groundwater wells were sources of drinking water in Leavenworth
- 61% knew that the Icicle River was a source of drinking water in Leavenworth
- 43% knew that groundwater was a source of drinking water in Leavenworth
- 37% thought that the Wenatchee River and/or Lake Wenatchee was a source of drinking water for Leavenworth


## Perception of the most significant threats to water quality in the Icicle

The City draws water from both Icicle Creek and wells near the Wenatchee River. The water we provide can be from either of these two sources individually, or a blend of both sources. We have a source water protection plan available from our office that provides more information.

As of this last February, Stan Adams retired and Amica Briody is the new Water Plant Supervisor. Amica has a total of 12 years of past experience and education. She has grown up in Leavenworth and is excited for the opportunity to provide her community with quality drinking water.

We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. All actions regarding improvements to the Water System Plan and infrastructure are approved by the Leavenworth City Council. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our City Council regularly scheduled meetings on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall.

The City of Leavenworth routinely monitors for constituents (contaminants) in your drinking water according to Federal and State regulations. The tables included in this report show the results of our monitoring for the period of **January 1<sup>st</sup> to December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2015**. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily pose a health risk.

## Welcome to Enchantment Permit Area

### Permit terms, Rules and Regulations:

- Permits are **NON-TRANSFERRABLE**. Only the party leader may redeem permit.

- Your permit is valid for camping **ONLY** in the zone indicated on the permit. You may day hike through another zone, but it is your responsibility to camp only in the proper zone. If violated, the permit becomes invalid, all group members will be cited and required to leave the permit area. (However, permits issued for the "Core Enchantments" are valid for camping in any zone.)

- Avoid walking on vegetation. Stay on the trail or durable surfaces such as snow, rock and sand. Follow existing rock cairns, but do not build your own rock cairns or rock walls. Do not pull rocks out of the ground. Do not knock over established cairns.

- While travelling, camping, or otherwise present within any of the permit zones, you must present a valid permit and photo ID upon request to any Forest Officer. Have your permit with you while traveling; keep the permit on your person, rather than leaving it in your campsite or buried at the bottom of your pack.

- Dogs are prohibited throughout the permit zones.

- Campfires are prohibited anywhere above 5,000 feet of elevation or within 1/2 mile of any of the lakes within the five permit zones.

- Biolite or other wood burning camp stoves are not permitted.

- Maximum party size is 8 people while traveling or camping. Two permits cannot be combined to form a group larger than 8.

- Use toilets where provided. Otherwise, bury human waste (feces) at least 8 inch deep and at least 200 feet from water or campsites. Pack out or bury all toilet paper at least 8 inch deep - animals will dig up shallow buried toilet paper. Do not put trash in toilets. Pack it out!

- Do not urinate on vegetation or in your campsite. Where possible use toilets, or urinate into rock crevices, gaps between boulders, or other places which discourage goats from pawing up plants and soil.

- Do not feed or otherwise encourage wildlife to be less than wild - treat them with respect and keep your distance.

# ALPINE LAKES WILDERNESS-WIDE REGULATIONS



Wilderness areas have been set aside by congress and defined as...  
 "...an area where the earth and its community of life are untrammeled by man, where man himself is a visitor who does not remain."  
 These regulations were developed to help insure that.

## Wilderness Permits

Permits are required for overnight and day use throughout the Alpine Lakes Wilderness between May 15 and October 31. Permits can be obtained at trailheads and Forest Service offices.

## Enchantment Permits

Limited overnight permits for the Enchantment Permit Area are required May 15 through October 31. Contact the Leavenworth Ranger Station at 509-548-2550 for more information or website: [fs.usda.gov/okawen](http://fs.usda.gov/okawen)

## Bury Human Waste Away From Water Sources

Select a site at least 200 feet from water. Bury waste in a hole 3 to 6 inches deep and cover with organic soil. Use backcountry toilets where provided. Pack out all toilet paper.

## Pack Out Litter

Littering is illegal. Pack out all that was left by others. Never backcountry toilets.

## Wilderness Permits

Permits are required to enter the wilderness. Permits may be obtained at trailheads and Ranger Stations. (see exception below)

## Enchantment Permits

If you are going to be in the Enchantment Permit Area as an "overnight" user, which includes access from the Eightmile Lake, Snow Lakes and Stuart / Colchuck Lake trailheads, a regulatory quota permit is required May 15 to October 31.

## Destinations with Designated Campsites for Hikers

Camping is permitted only at designated campsites (marked by a tent symbol) within 1/2 mile of the following destinations:  
 Chain Lakes      Lake Mary  
 Doelle Lakes      Nada & Snow Lakes  
 Upper Florence Lake  
 Headlight Basin & Ingalls Lake

## Pack and Saddle Camps

Camping with pack and saddle animals, including llamas and goats, is permitted only at designated stock campsites (marked by a horseshoe symbol) within 1/2 mile of the following destinations:  
 Chain Lakes      Timothy Meadows  
 Doelle Lakes      Frosty Pass area  
 Meadow Camp      Flora & Brigham Lakes  
 Ingalls Creek Drainage

## Pack and Saddle Closures

The District prohibits camping with stock, within 1/2 mile of the following destinations:

 Cradle Lake      Upper Florence Lake  
 Eightmile & Little Eightmile      Josephine Lake

## Dog Restrictions

Due to the heavy use, user conflict and wildlife concerns, dogs are prohibited in and on any trail accessing the Enchantment Core Area, Stuart Lake, Colchuck Lake, Snow Lakes, Eightmile Lakes, Carolines to Windy Pass, Headlight Basin, Ingalls Lake and Mt. Stuart, except that dogs are allowed in a 50 foot wide corridor along Ingalls Creek Trail #1215 from Turnpike Trail Jct. #1301 to Stuart Pass.



# THE ENCHANTMENTS SNOW CREEK TRAIL #1553

## WILDERNESS PERMITS

A valid permit is required for both day and overnight use in all five zones of the Enchantment Permit Area. See Map to right.

DAY HIKERS can obtain a free, self-issued wilderness permit at the trailhead (in box near this sign).

From May 15 to October 31, overnight users must obtain a permit through [recreation.gov](http://recreation.gov) or the Wenatchee River Ranger Station daily lottery. See **CAMPING** permit information to the right.



## CLIMBERS

A valid overnight permit is required if you plan on camping or bivouacking. Plan ahead for length of route. Unintentional overnight bivys are a violation of permit system.

Travel and camp on durable surfaces.

Minimize webbing or other gear behind. If you leave one, take an old one out.

On climbing routes, human waste must be packed out.

Be aware of and respect any wildlife or other closure areas.

Do not wrap ropes around trees, use slings instead to reduce impacts.

## WARNING THE ROUTE TO AASGARD PASS IS STEEP AND MAY BE SNOW COVERED


Use extra caution when climbing or descending snow due to many hazards:

- Exposed or hidden creeks & waterfalls
- Open holes, thin snow and hidden rocks

**Aasgard Pass is not advised for hikers not prepared and equipped for steep snow travel**

In recent years, hikers have died after glissading and falling into a crack or hole in the snowpack formed by a creek pouring over a cliff. Be aware of the following hazards:

- Water running beneath the seasonal snowpack
- Natural glissade path funnels directly to the hazardous waterfall area (marked with red arrow in photo). This waterfall is easily seen from below but can be hard to see or hear from above, especially while glissading
- Assuming a glissade track is safe to follow
- Glissading into terrain you can't visually assess



## MOUNTAIN GOATS

Habituated Mountain Goats are in this area and are closely approaching people and entering campsites. Habituated wildlife can become aggressive. Goats have sharp, lethal horns.

Stay at least 50 yards away and do not feed them.

If a goat approaches you, slowly move away to keep a safe distance.

If the goat follows, be prepared to chase it off by yelling, waving arms and clothing, or throwing rocks!

Goats crave salts. Use toilets where available. Otherwise, urinate on bare rocks, between rocks or locations inaccessible to goats and at least 200 feet away from trails or campsites. Do not leave sweaty clothes unattended.

# ALPINE LAKES WILDERNESS

**Welcome! You are entering a special place...**

Congress established this Wilderness to protect and maintain its wild character, intact ecosystems, and natural processes and to provide outstanding opportunities for solitude and primitive recreation. The Wilderness Act is a promise that these special places will endure.

Wilderness is "...lands designated for preservation and protection in their natural condition... and an area where the earth and its community of life are untrammelled by man."

Do your part to ensure that this Wilderness will remain pristine for future generations. Leave No Trace.

Wilderness travel carries inherent risk. Know your skill level and come prepared for traveling in a mountain environment.

## ENCHANTMENT PERMIT AREA RULES


These regulations apply in all five zones of Enchantment Permit Area (see map to the right):

- All individuals must have a completed Wilderness permit for all day and/or overnight trips. See day hiking panel or camping panel for specific requirements.
- Group size is limited to 8 people. Two permits cannot be combined to form a group larger than 8.
- Motorized use and mechanized transport is prohibited in Wilderness areas, including: motorbikes, bicycles, drones, aircraft, strollers, chainsaws, carts, hang gliders, rock drills.
- Dogs, and all pets, are prohibited. Nearby trails open to dogs: Icicle Ridge, Fourth of July Creek, Chatter Creek, Icicle Gorge, Icicle Creek. Why no dogs in Enchantments? Dogs in heavily used areas cause undue stress for wildlife and hikers, conflict with other dogs, sanitation concerns, and destroy the tranquility with their barking.
- Stock (horses, llamas, etc) are prohibited on the Snow Creek and Colchuck Lake trails. Stuart Lake trail is closed to stock from January 1 until the first Saturday after Labor Day.
- Campfires are not allowed above 5,000' elevation or within ½ mile of any lake.
- Pack out all garbage including food waste. Do not burn or bury any garbage. Pack out all human waste, bury it or use toilets. Do not put human waste 'blue bags' in toilets.
- Do not cut trees, snags, or boughs. Do not walk or camp in areas posted as "Closed for Rehabilitation."
- Storing or caching equipment or supplies for more than 48 hours is prohibited. Geocaches are prohibited in Wilderness.
- Preserve the quiet. Excessive noise, such as music through speakers, is prohibited.

# CAMPING

## WILDERNESS PERMITS

A valid permit is required for camping in each of the five zones in the Enchantment Permit Area (see map to right). From May 15 to October 31, overnight users must obtain a permit through [recreation.gov](http://recreation.gov) website or the Wenatchee River Ranger Station daily lottery. Permits are \$5/person/day.

You **MUST** enter the permit area on the entry date shown on permit. This is a quota system so this ensures available campsites, reduces the number of people encountered and limits resource damage. You may camp only in the zone(s) indicated on your permit.

You must carry permit and photo identification with you and present these upon request to any Forest Officer.

## WILDERNESS CAMPING

All members of a group must camp together in one campsite. Separate groups totaling more than 8 people cannot camp or travel together.

Campsites are found not made: Travel and camp on impacted and durable surfaces, stay off of any vegetation. Hang food, toiletries and trash to prevent bears, marmots, and mice from getting it.

Pack out all human waste or dig a hole 6-8 inches deep and 200 feet from water or campsite, fill hole and cover with soil. Or use toilets if available - locate them before needed. Urinate between rocks to keep goats from pawing up vegetation to get the salt in your urine. Do not put garbage or human waste 'blue bags' in toilets.

Wash dishes and bathe at least 200 feet from any water, and don't use any type of soap.


Leave rocks in the ground. Don't build rock walls or other structures.

## SNOW AND NADA LAKES CAMPING

Within 1/2 mile of Upper and Lower Snow Lakes, or Nada Lake, you are required to use a hiker designated campsite. There are 18 designated sites at Snow Lakes, and 6 sites at Nada Lake. Before passing a site by, consider how many possible sites lie ahead, and if you are willing to hike back if necessary.

### Why Designated Sites?

- Concentrates use to sites that are already impacted.
- Helps prevent erosion and further damage to fragile vegetation at sites that are not suited for camping.
- Helps provide for a sense of privacy for campers.



## SNOW LAKES WATER RELEASE

Since 1939 the Leavenworth National Fish Hatchery has released water from Snow Lake during the summer and fall to improve water flow and cooler temperature in Icicle Creek. This benefits both the hatchery fish program and Icicle Creek habitat. In 1939 a 2,000' long tunnel was cut through solid rock to the bottom of Snow Lake. Water is released into Nada Lake from Snow Lake through a 30" diameter pipe. The pipe is located a few hundred feet from the trail between Nada and Snow Lakes and you may see water gushing from the pipe.

## TRAILHEAD PARKING

A Northwest Forest Pass or Interagency Annual Pass is required on vehicles. Those with a permit to camp in Enchantment Permit Area must print and display the parking permit that comes with overnight permit. The Washington State Discover Pass is not valid here or at any Forest Service site.

## ENFORCEMENT

To protect fragile ecosystems and reduce environmental impacts please follow these rules and regulations, including enforceable Forest Service regulations with maximum penalties of \$5,000 and/or 6 months in jail. Violation of permit terms or other Forest Service regulations may also invalidate an issued permit, requiring a group to terminate their visit. The Enchantments is heavily patrolled by law enforcement and forest protection officers. Thank you for helping to keep the Enchantment Permit Area wild.

- Wash dishes and bathe at least 200 feet away from all water, and don't use any type of soap.
- Avoid fragile vegetation, stay on designated trails. Keep pets and stock animals at least 200 feet from lakes and streams.




