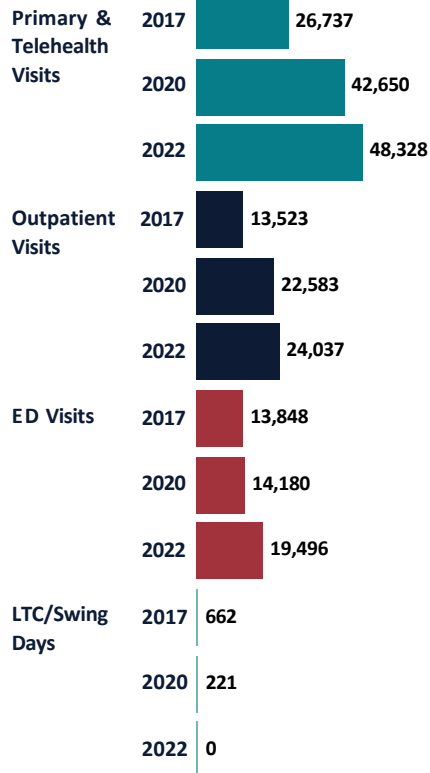

History

The first hospital in the area was built in 1889. In 1956, the president of Simpson Timber Company donated funds to build the Mark E. Reed Memorial Hospital in McCleary. Grays Harbor Public Health District #1 was formed in 1982. A replacement hospital opened in Elma in 2013 using bonds and USDA funding, and the hospital's name was changed to Summit Pacific Medical Center (SPMC). SPMC was designated as a Critical Access Hospital in 2000 by meeting the federal and state designation requirements.

In 2007 an RHC opened on the hospital campus in McCleary, and in 2011 a second RHC was opened in Elma. In 2019 SPMC opened a new 60,000 sq. ft. Wellness Center that directly supports SPMC's vision of building "the healthiest community in the Nation". SPMC is a member of the Rural Health Collaborative (TRC). TRC exists to support member hospitals to achieve service excellence through collaboration and innovation.

Today

SPMC has enjoyed exceptionally strong growth; especially in primary care and outpatient services. This is directly attributable to its commitment to partnership, innovation and to programming that supports health and wellness. In 2019, in partnership with Providence St. Peter, SPMC established a Rural Training Track (RTT) program. The ACGME accredited Program supports the final two years of residency in rural areas, as data shows that providers trained in rural areas are more likely to practice in rural areas.

In response to community need, SPMC has also opened a low-barrier walk-in Medication-Assisted-Treatment (MAT) Clinic. Based on its success in engaging those struggling with opioid use disorder, the Clinic was awarded a Rural Quality Everyday Extraordinary Award by the State Hospital Association. SPMC partnered with local education agencies and Elma Family Dental to form a consortium, securing a HRSA grant to implement a school-based telehealth program in Elma. SPMC is currently undertaking a major expansion expected to be complete in Spring 2026. The project will nearly double the current hospital footprint and will increase inpatient beds, the Emergency Department, and provide 24/7 MRI services.

Workforce

20% of total budgeted FTEs are unfilled (74.4 FTE). The most pressing unfilled positions today are Patient Access, MAs, and RNs.

The top issue faced by SPMC in recruiting is a lack of qualified candidates.

To support recruitment, Summit offers an in-house training program for MAs and Lab Assistants and clinical rotations for nursing and medical students.

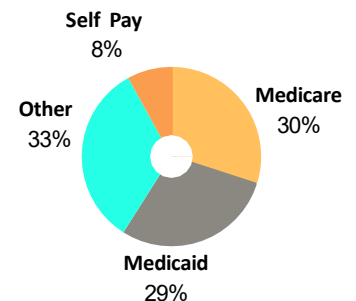
Maternal Health

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Our Community

Agriculture and timber have historically been the mainstays of the local economy, though recently, the area is influenced by the growth of commuters and retirees.

The SPMC service area continues to grow slowly, with all growth occurring in the 65+ cohort. The service area grew almost 3% between 2020 and 2024 and is projected to grow an additional 4% by 2029. Currently, about 22% of the population is 65+. This cohort grew by almost 15% between 2020 and 2024 and is expected to grow another 14% by 2029 and accounts for 24% of the population.

Hispanic residents represent 10% of the total population in 2024 and are expected to grow another 21%, to almost 12% of the population by 2029. Over 30% of District residents are living below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level.

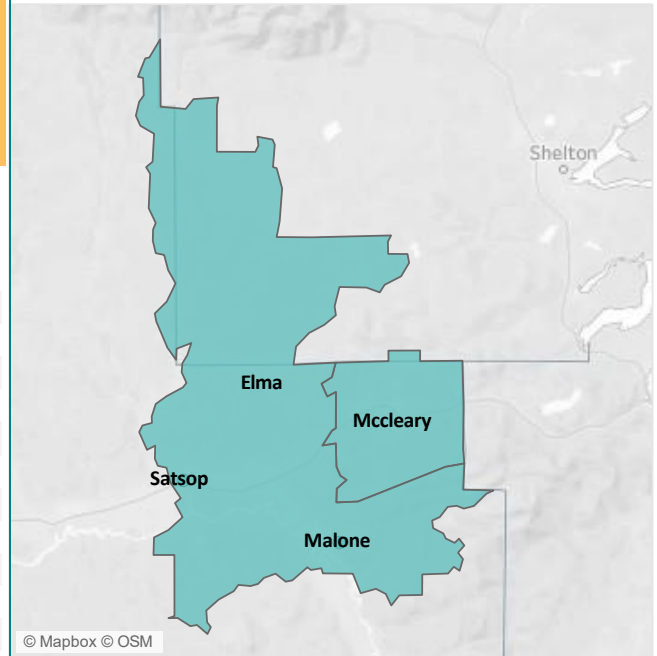

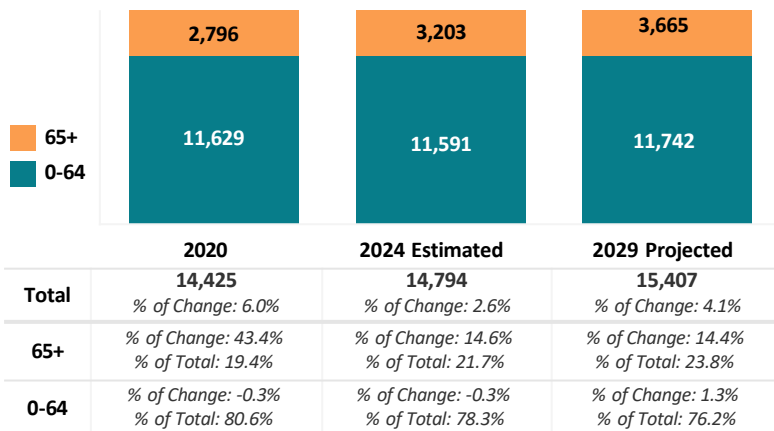
Adults Who Smoke: Adults who report having smoke 100 or more cigarettes in their lifetime and currently smoke every day or some days.

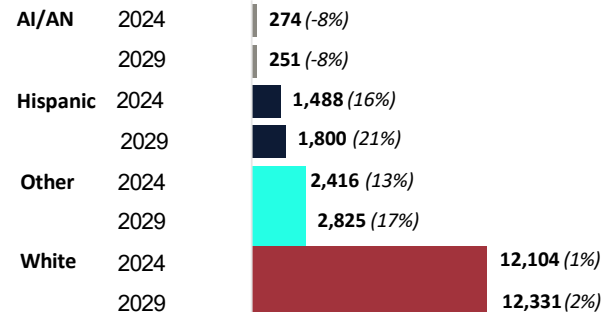
Population
