The Washington State Department of Health (DOH) is pleased to present to you the second Biennial Report of the Disciplinary Process, as required by RCW 18.130.310.

The department's Health Professions Quality Assurance Division is responsible for promoting the effective partnership among DOH, the Professional Licensing Boards, the public, and the health professions by: setting professional standards; examining applicants for licensure; reviewing applicant qualifications and background; receiving and processing complaints; conducting investigations, audits, and inspections; supporting licensing board hearings, meetings, and disciplinary processes; developing and implementing administrative rules; and developing and implementing legislation.

This report provides information on disciplinary activities for all health professions, including tables for easy reference. The data submitted is for the 1991-93 biennium.

During the upcoming biennium we will be focusing on implementing 1993 legislation. Major emphasis will be placed on enhancing the disciplinary process and other quality assurance issues related to Health Care Reform.

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1991-93 Biennial Report Of The Disciplinary Process

This is the second report of the Department of Health on disciplinary actions for regulated health care professions as required under the Uniform Disciplinary Act, RCW 18.130.310.

Expectations on the part of consumers continue to increase and the workload of the programs has increased dramatically since the Uniform Disciplinary Act was adopted in 1984. The department and the boards in partnership are working to evaluate and revise administrative systems for accomplishing necessary work. Continued careful attention to funding and staffing of the programs will be necessary to maintain the benefits achieved in the past two years.

The disciplinary process has and continues to evolve into a sophisticated legal process. The legislative and legal communities emphasis on uniformity has resulted in the establishment of an Office of Professional Standards, and the establishment of uniform procedures. Profession program expenditures on the disciplinary process (investigations, Assistant Attorney General support, Review Judges and disciplinary hearings) continue to increase.

This document provides summary charts which illustrate activities for all health professions and the various aspects of the disciplinary system. These include the regulatory acts that affect health care and the disciplinary framework; a listing of the professions and their disciplining authority; and a simplified disciplinary process chart.

During the last biennium, we transitioned into a new licensing system. Workload indicators were also revised during this time to better reflect current practices. Since the type of information we are gathering changed mid-stream, we are unable to provide the charts used in the previous reports.

During the 1993 legislative session the Department of Health received recommendations for improvements to the disciplinary process from the legislature. The Department and the disciplinary boards are in the process of developing uniform procedures for conducting investigations, responding to public inquiries, informal resolution to allegations of unprofessional conduct, and the use of hearing officers.

During the 1991-1993 biennium, Uniform Disciplinary Guidelines and Model Procedural Rules were drafted. These are being presented to all disciplinary boards for review and recommendation. To date, both the disciplinary guidelines and model procedural rules have been viewed favorably by the boards.

Health Professions Quality Assurance Division

Mission

Promote an effective partnership among the Department of Health, Boards and Committees, health professions, and the public which improves the quality of health care in the state of Washington.

Overview

The Health Professions Quality Assurance Division regulates professional licensing programs to promote access to high quality, cost-effective health services. Division personnel work to promote and maintain open and continuing consultation and partnership with Boards, Committees, professional associations, other interested organizations and the public to achieve program goals and objectives, and assure health care consumer protection, including protection from impaired providers.

Relationship With Boards and Committees

Especially important to the Division's success are close and open working relationships with the 34 Boards and Committees. The Boards and Committees provide a critical link to over 160,000 health care professionals either licensed, certified or registered by the state. Recruitment and development of well qualified Board and Committee members, including members who represent the public at large, is a high priority, and the Division works closely in this area with provider associations, other interested organizations and the Governor's office.

The Division achieves its mission through a variety of activities, which include:

- Supporting Board and Committee hearings and meetings.
- Reviewing applicant qualifications and background.
- Examining applicants for licensure.
- Receiving and processing complaints.
- Conducting investigations, audits and inspections.
- Processing disciplinary actions.
- Researching, developing and implementing rules and policies.
- Providing education services and disseminating information.
- Developing and monitoring proposed legislation.

Significant Accomplishments of Boards and Programs During the 1991-1993 Biennium

Quality Assurance

- Adopted a written policy to protect the public from sexual misconduct by health care professionals.
- Adopted infection control policies and procedures for dental health care workers.
- Completed transition of all health professions to a new automated data system.
- Conducted a statewide anti-tampering drug education campaign.
- Implemented disciplinary guidelines for Pharmacists.
- Implemented detailed, comprehensive ethics policy for Board and Committee activities.
- Implemented the Chiropractic X-Ray Technician program.
- Developed practice standards for Sex Offender Treatment Providers.
- Updated code of ethics rule for Psychologists to include ethics and sanctions relative to sexual misconduct.
- Developed a contract between the Pharmacy Board and the Food and Drug Administration to inspect medical gas fillers and provide related education on safe practices.
- Revised conditions for probation for Practical Nurses to help assure compliance with Board intent.
- Provided pharmacology education and training to update Doctors of Naturopathy in the use of drugs they are authorized to prescribe.

Improving Access to Care

• Expanded the substance abuse treatment and monitoring services of Washington Health Professional Services from 4 to 26 professions, promoting the retention of professionals in practice while protecting public safety.

- Amended laws regulating Physician Assistants to authorize either the Board of Medical Examiners or the Board of Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery to approve either alternate supervisors.
- Approved new education programs for Dental Hygienists and Practical Nurses, promoting the goal of graduates' successful compliance with licensing requirements.
- Expanded scope of practice of Dental Hygiene to reduce supervision required for the application of sealants, promoting access for school sealant programs.
- Increased frequency of examinations to expedite entry of new professionals into areas of need.
- Developed and implemented new credentailing programs for Dentists,
 Optometrists and Midwives.

Cost Containment, Efficiency and Productivity

- Increased use of settlements, resulting in more effective use of Board hearings.
- Conducted staff development training on topics of impaired practice, cultural diversity, the Americans with Disabilities Act, public disclosure, sexual harassment, media relations, Total Quality Management, and ethics.
- Developed a written policy for use of staff attorneys and began using staff attorneys to reduce AAG costs and increase productivity.
- Developed a pre-hearing process and established the Office of Professional Standards to improve timely disposition of disciplinary cases and assist in alleviating Board workloads.

Outreach and Collaboration with Boards, Committees, and Stakeholders

- Developed and distributed newsletters providing timely and educational information concerning program activities, policies, and other news.
- Participated in community focus groups on topics including practice issues, impaired practitioners, and regulatory practices.
- Expanded presentations to educators and associations, promoting better understanding and compliance with program requirements.

Health Professions Quality Assurance Division has developed the following initiatives for 1993-95 related to disciplinary activity, quality assurance and health care reform:

Quality Assurance

- Increase outreach and education forums and public service projects.
- Continue to develop Health Professions Quality Assurance role in quality assurance and health care reform, including practice parameters and guidelines.
- Devise strategies to address scope of practice issues and decisions.
- Design process to address regulatory responsibilities related to health care workers with HIV/AIDS.
- Continue to streamline and standardize the disciplinary process.
- Enhance relations with assistant attorney generals.

Development and Pilot Implementation of Uniform Complaint Assessment, Investigation and Disciplinary

Process

- Develop a centralized framework for the review of proposed rules, legislation, health policies, and intra board communication.
- Develop uniform procedural rules to respond to public inquiries.
- Develop a method by which license holders or applicants may request a "good cause" time extension to respond to statement of charges.
- Develop a plan for implementing model procedural rules for the disciplinary process.
- Develop and implement uniform procedures for conducting investigations.
- Develop a plan for implementing the presiding officer concept for boards.
- Incorporate the Health Care Assistants and Pharmacy professions within the Uniform Disciplinary Act.

 Develop uniform procedures and forms to implement informal resolutions to allegations of unprofessional conduct by health care professionals.

Achievement of Mutual Goals and Activities by Boards and

Develop a self assessment plan for boards and committees.

The legislature intends that state government policy stabilize health services costs, assure access to essential services for all residents, actively address the health care needs of persons of color, improve the public's health, and reduce unwarranted health services costs to preserve the viability of non health care businesses.

Health Care Reform

- Provide assistance to Health Services Commission (HSC) in designing a
 personal health care data system; Department of Health will be repository
 for data with policy and oversight by the HSC.
- Establish procedures for pharmacists to advise physicians and other health care providers of the costs of prescription medications.
- Consult with HSC to establish standards and monetary penalties for prohibiting provider investment and referrals that present a conflict of interest resulting from inappropriate financial gain for the provider or his or her immediate family.
- Identify specific practice areas where practice indicators and risk management protocols have been developed, and recommend their use to the HSC.
- Develop rule listing professions with independent practice including the availability and appropriate level of malpractice insurance.



The number of cases received between July 1, 1991 and June 30, 1993 was about 9,000. Of this number about 80-85% of the cases result in no formal disciplinary action. After intake, review and investigation, the disciplining authorities have determined no violation has been committed and the case is closed.

Glossary Of Terms Disciplinary & Licensing Workload

Complaints

The number of complaints received. Licensees may have one to several complaints lodged against them. If these are received within a short time of each other and/or are related to each other by either complainant or nature of complaint, they may be combined into a single case for investigative and disciplinary purposes. After a case is received it is assessed by program staff to determine if there is jurisdiction for the complaint before proceeding to investigation.

Disciplinary Action

Action taken by the Disciplinary Authority against a licensee or applicant including Assurance of Discontinuance, Findings of Fact, Retired Status Agreement, Stipulated Order and Summary Suspensions.

Compliance and Monitoring

As part of the elements of a Final Order, licensees are frequently required to adhere to specific requirements. The count in this column is a total of the number of licenses on compliance or monitoring status.

Glossary Of Terms Disciplinary & Licensing Actions

Final Order	An order issued by the Disciplinary Authority as the result of a formal hearing.
Stipulated Order	An order entered into by the Disciplinary Authority and licensee as a result of a settlement agreement without a formal hearing.
Assurance of Discontinuance	Cases in which the licensee and the Disciplinary Authority enter into an agreement stating that the licensee will comply with specified laws.
Treatment Self Referral	The number of known licensees who enter into a volunteer substance abuse monitoring program e.g. Washington Health Professional Services or Washington Recovery Assistance Program for Pharmacy.
Treatment Board Referral	The number of licensees ordered by the Disciplinary Authority to enter into a substance abuse monitoring program.
Summary Suspension	The number of cases in which emergency action is taken against a license.
Revocation	Cases in which the licensee had his or her license revoked.
Number of Licenses Issued	This number reflects the number of individuals receiving a license for the biennium.
