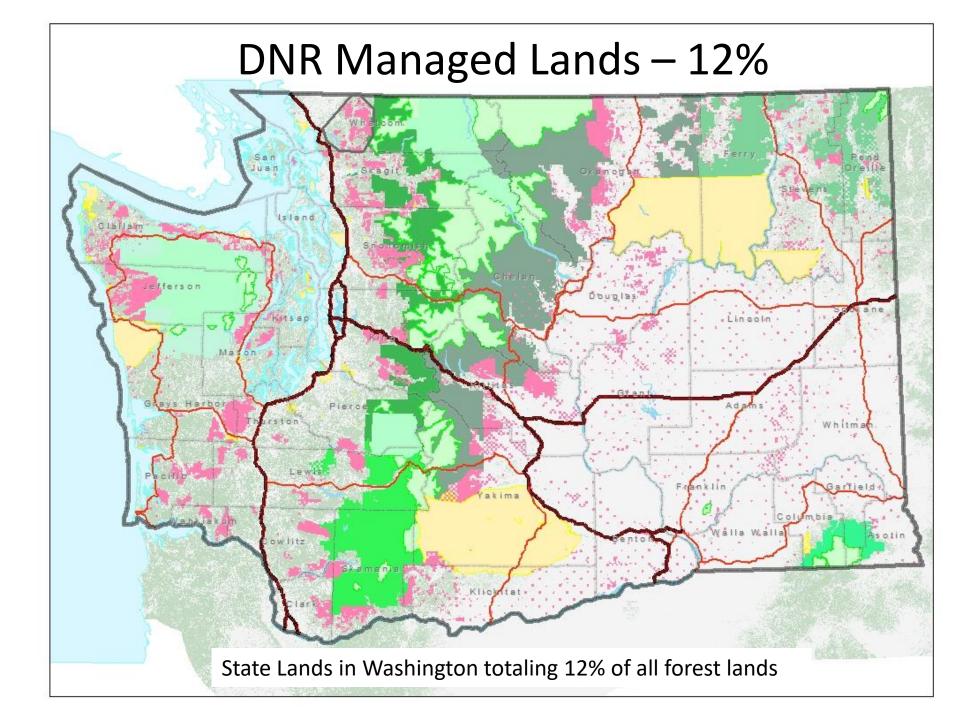

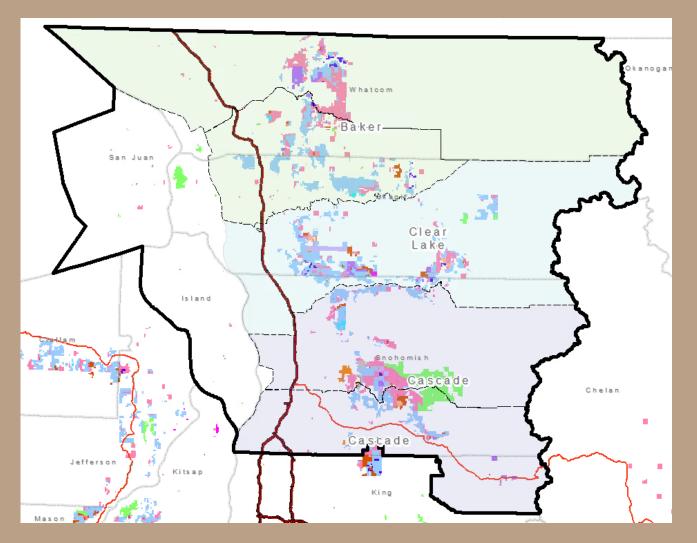

Trust Duties and Mandate

Trust Duties

- The fiduciary aspect of trust management requires DNR to manage these lands to produce perpetual income for the beneficiaries (the trusts).
- Trust Mandate
- The 'trust mandate' concerns the common law obligations of a trustee to operate as a prudent person on behalf of the trusts.
- The legal construction of Washington's trust lands also creates considerable differences in how these lands are managed when compared to other public lands and private fiduciary trusts.

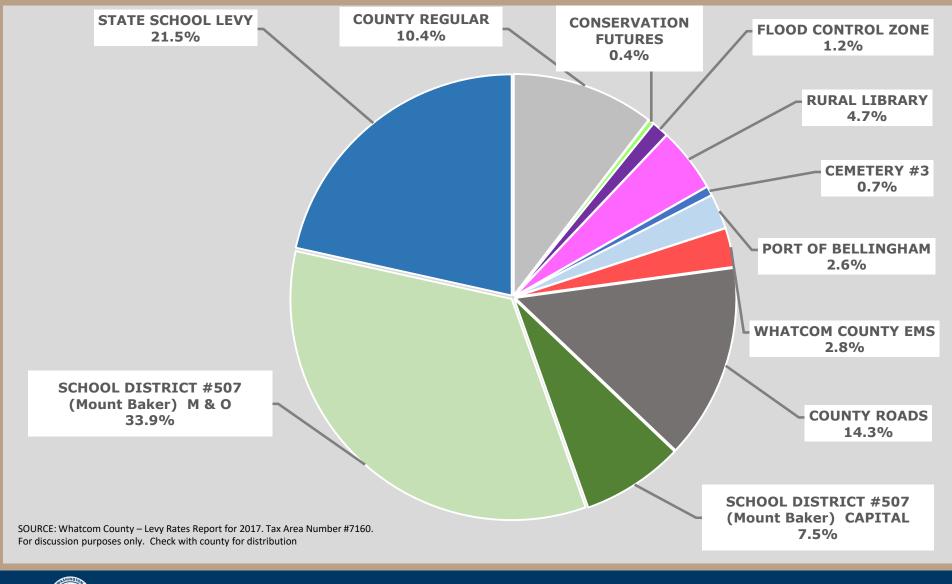

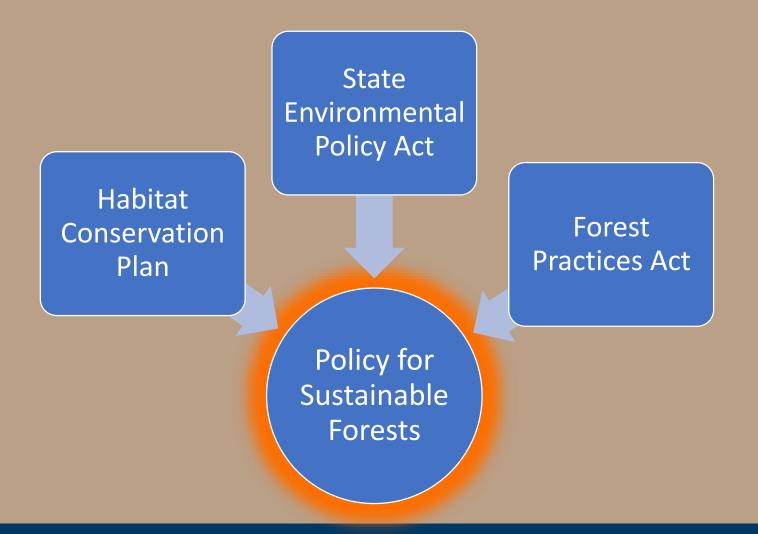

Regulatory Framework Policy for Sustainable Forests

Guides the management and stewardship of 2.1 million acres of forested trust lands

Economic Performance

• Definition, calculation, and recalculation of the sustainable harvest level

Forest Ecosystem Health and Productivity

• Outlines specific aspects for protection and management

Social and Cultural Benefits

• Protection and promotion of various land uses

<u>Implementation</u>

• Outlines management procedures for achieving the above three



Regulatory Framework Habitat Conservation Plan

- Final plan adopted 1997
- Outlines conservation strategies for threatened and endangered species as well as a multitude of habitats

- Federally Listed Species and Species of Concern
 - Bald Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, Fish, Amphibians, etc...







Regulatory Framework State Environmental Policy Act

- Enacted 1971
- Process for reviewing agency projects and alternatives
- Consider impacts on all elements of the environment
 - Natural: earth, air, water, plants & animals
 - Built: transportation, public services & utilities
- Determine and evaluate mitigation needs
- Provide opportunity for public comment

STATE FOREST LAND SEPA ENVIRONMENTAL CHECKLIST

Purpose of checklist:

Governmental agencies use this checklist to help determine whether the environmental impacts of your proposal are significant. This information is also helpful to determine if available avoidance, minimization or compensatory mitigation measures will address the probable significant impacts or if an environmental impact statement will be prepared to further analyze the proposal.

Instructions for applicants:

This environmental checklist asks you to describe some basic information about your proposal. Please answer each question accurately and carefully, to the best of your knowledge. You may need to consult with an agency specialist or private consultant for some questions. You may use four <u>specialis</u> or "does not apply" only when you can explain why it does not apply and not when the answer is unknown. You may also attach or incorporate by reference additional studies reports. Complete and accurate answers to these questions often avoid delays with the SEPA process as well as later in the decision-making process.

Question: in italic: are supplemental to Ecology's standard environmental checklist. They have been added by the DNR to assist in the review of state forest land propocals. Adjacency and landcape! watershed-administrative-unit (RAU) maps for hist propocal are available on the DNR internet website at <u>http://www.dnr.wa.gov/state-mvironmental-policy-act-seps</u>. These maps may also be reviewed at the DNR regional office responsible for the propocal. This checklist is to be used for SEPA evaluation of state forest land arititists.

The checklist questions apply to <u>all parts of your proposal</u> even if you plan to do them over a period of time or on different parcels of land. Attach may additional information that will help describe your proposal or its environmental effects. The agency to which you submit this checklist may ask you to explain your answers or provide additional information reasonably related to determining if there may be significant adverse impact.

Instructions for Lead Agencies:

Additional information may be necessary to evaluate the existing environment, all interrelated aspects of the proposal and an analysis of adverse impacts. The checklist is considered the first but not necessarily the only source of information needed to make an adequate threshold determination. Once a threshold determination is made, the lead agency is responsible for the completeness and accuracy of the checklist and other supporting documents.

Use of checklist for nonproject proposals:

For nonproject proposals (such as ordinances, regulations, plans and programs), complete the applicable parts of sections A and B plus the <u>SUPPLINENTAL SHEET FOR CONFORCEMENT</u>. Please completely anxwer all questions that apply and note that the words "project," "applicant," and "property or site" should be read as "proposal," "proponent," and "affected geographic area," respectively. The lead agency may exclude (for non-project) questions in Part B - Environmental Elements -that do not contribute meaningfully to the analysis of the proposal.
