RCW 18.83.010.  Any psychologist providing substance abuse/dependency services would also need to comply with the "competence" rule, <a href="#">WAC 246-924-353</a> . Under that rule, a psychologist who determines that he/she does not have the "appropriate education, training, or experience" to provide substance abuse/chemical dependency services to any particular client or category of clients would refer to other providers. A licensed psychologist may also need to meet additional requirements imposed by an employer, a third-party payor, etc..	No
