The three most populated counties in the state provided data at the subcounty level based on their current subcounty designations. The other two more populated counties- Spokane and Clark- do not currently have subcounty designated health planning regions.

King County


King County is broken down into South, Seattle, East and North Regions. The Region boundaries are defined either by aggregated postal ZIP codes or by U.S. Census block groups. The Census-based boundaries are used whenever possible; ZIP code-based boundaries are used when health outcome data are only available by ZIP code.

The major difference between the block group- and ZIP code-based Region boundaries occurs between North and Seattle Regions. Two ZIP codes (98177, 98133) cross the Seattle city bounds into the North Region and are included as part of North. Along the East-South Region border, two ZIP codes (98056, 98059) overlap both Regions, and are included as part of South Region. ZIP code 98045 is counted as East Region.

North Region includes the areas of Bothell, Cottage Lake, Kenmore, Lake Forest Park, Shoreline, and Woodinville. East Region includes Bellevue, Carnation, Duvall, Issaquah, Kirkland, Medina, Mercer Island, Newcastle, North Bend, Redmond, Sammamish, and Skykomish. South region contains Auburn, Burien, Covington, Des Moines, Enumclaw, Federal Way, Kent, Maple Valley, Normandy Park, Renton, Tukwila, SeaTac, White Center/Boulevard Park, and Vashon Island.



Indicator Definitions:

Preterm Birth is the percent of total live births that were born before 37 completed weeks of gestation, 2006-2008

Low Birth Weight is the percent of total live births that weighed less than 2500 grams (5 lbs 8 oz), 2006-2008

Infant Mortality is the rate of infant deaths under 365 days old per 1000 total live births, 2002-2008

Unemployment is the annual percent of unemployment, May 2010

Poverty is the percent of the total population living below 100% of the federal poverty level in 2008

Crime is the rate of total crimes per 1000 total population, 2009

Domestic Violence is the rate of domestic violence crimes including simple assaults per 1000 total population, 2009
